Alfred George^{1,2,3,4,5,6,7} (M), son of **Alfred George**^{7,8} and **Margaret Robinson Wilson**^{1,7,8,9}, was born on 1 Oct 1851 in Fulton, Callaway County, Missouri, ^{7,10} died on 2 Jun 1928 in Rifle, Garfield County, Colorado, ⁷ at age 76, and was buried in Rose Hill Cemetery, Rifle, Garfield County, Colorado. ^{7,10,11}

At the time of the 1870 census, he was a farm laborer in Canon City, Fremont, Colorado Territory. At the time of the 1880 census, he was listed as a laborer in Gothic, Gunnison, Colorado. At the time of the 1900 census, he was married with 4 children and owned his own farm in Rifle, Garfield County, Colorado. He continued to farm through 1910, but by the time of the 1920 census, he gave his occupation as none.

ALFRED AND CLARA GEORGE By Claude George

Alfred George came to Rifle Creek in 1886, bringing cattle and other livestock. He returned to Grand Junction where his wife was awaiting the birth of their first child, and in March 1887 came back to Rifle Creek with his wife, Clara and their infant son, Claude.

The trip was rough but uneventful until they arrived at Webster Point. The grade on the east side was exceedingly steep. In making the hazardous descent the wagon in which Mrs. George and their three-month old son were riding upset. She had been feeding the baby from a cup, and though the wagon rolled over several times, mother and child were uninjured---and she still held the cup in her hand.

They first lived in the Nathan Worrall cabin, made of logs, dirt floor, and sod roof. Clothing was handmade. Boys wore dresses or "kilts" until quite good size. Claude remembers his first pair of pants. Mrs. George had gone to town and left her son in the care of Greeley Brown. He cut off the legs of a pair of his own overalls, of course they were much too large, but Claude was delighted. Mr. Brown admonished Clara that her son was much too large for dresses and should be clothed in pants, henceforth.

Alfred George and William Reed built the first cow camp on the Flat Tops. Mr. Reed was murdered at the cow camp he helped build, his assailant was never caught. The George cattle, branded 'Lazy E 6' ranged that area until 1957, the brand being handed down in the family, and is now owned by a grandson, though not being used for range cattle.

Alfred George rented land from Greeley Brown and later purchased it. Claude married Clarissa Mallory in 1911 and moved onto the adjacent land owned by his uncle Sam Stevenson. Later he united the Alfred George, Stevenson and Greeley Brown ranches under one ownership.

Clara's sister and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. John W. Armstrong lived in Rifle in a little frame cottage on the site of the present First National Bank. In 1892 Mr. Armstrong purchased an interest in the Rifle Reveille.

The career of Alfred George, of the Rifle neighborhood, in Garfield County, is full of interest and valuable suggestions, and his citizenship is of the sterling and useful character which has made the American working man notably one of the controlling factors of modern civilization. Mr. George was born in Calloway County, Missouri, on October 1, 1851, and in

that state he was reared to the age of thirteen, then coming with his mother and sister to Colorado in 1864, he has since mingled with the activities in this state, always bearing cheerfully the share of the community's burdens properly belonging to him and preformed faithfully the share of duties which has been incumbent on him. He received a slender common-school education, remaining at home and working in the interests of his parents until death ended their labors, the father dying in 1858, when the son was seven, and the mother in 1872, when he was twenty-one. His parents were Alfred and Margaret (Robinson) George, natives of Kentucky, who settled in Missouri when young where the father died and the mother and children moved to this state in 1864. The Father was a cabinet maker and dealt in real estate, but also made money as a farmer. He supported the Democratic party in political affairs, and with his wife he belonged to the Methodist church. They had a family of eight children, but two of whom are living, Annie, wife of Jasper P. Sears, of Denver and Alfred. The later had the usual experience of country boys of the West, for even the Missouri home of the family was on the frontier, and at an early life became inured to the hardships and privations of pioneer life. The trip from Missouri to Colorado was made over the plains with an ox team and occupied three months. There were Indian troubles before and behind the train, but it suffered no disaster and was not attacked. After the death of his mother, Mr. George rented land and ranched on it until 1886. In the fall of that year he moved to the Roaring Fork, near Emma, and the next spring to Grand Junction. From there he went out on the trail and engaged in raising cattle. In 1887 he settled on East Middle Rifle Creek and for a year was occupied in ranching on shares with H. G. Brown. He then in partnership with G. W. Noble, bought the improvements on his present ranch, which he preempted. It comprised one hundred and sixty acres, and a few years later the land was divided, each partner taking one-half. Mr. George has since sold forty acres of his tract, and is now profitably engaged in farming the other forty with good results, producing large yields of hay, grain, vegetables and fruit, and raising numbers of good cattle and horses. He has a good water right and the land responds generously to skillful tillage. On March 16, 1886, he was married to Miss Clara V. Noble, who was born in Iowa on September 4, 1860, and is the daughter of George W. and Marietta (Woolsey) Noble, the former a native of Pennsylvania and the latter of Iowa. Mrs. George is a sister of Mrs. Charles H. Harris, of this state, and the family record of her parents appears in a sketch of Mr. and Mrs. Harris, which will be found under their names in this family history work. Five children have been born to the George household. One daughter, Annie L., died on April 26, 1901. The living four are Claude A., Harry N., Clara M., and William Jasper. Mr. George has found a fruitful field for his enterprise in Colorado, and is well pleased with the state and is devoted to its best interests in every way. He is well esteemed by its people who know him and withholds no effort due on his part to promote their substantial progress and development and lasting good.

Alfred George came to Colorado in 1864 from Missouri. It took three months to make the trip which was on the frontier. The journey was made by ox team with Indian troubles all the way. In 1886 he settled at Emma and married a sister of Mrs. Charles Harris, Clara Noble. Before her marriage she proved up on the famous El Jebel ranch. In 1887 he, with Horace Greeley Brown and others started westward again. These intrepid pioneers pushed on down the Grand River below Glenwood Springs, they came to a high promontory. The river entirely filled the narrow canyon. They had to take their wagons apart and use ropes to haul them over the perpendicular side of the rock before they could pursue their way. They located near what is now the town of Rifle.

Alfred George, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred George, was born in Fulton, Missouri, October 1, 1851 and passed away last Friday evening, June first, his age being 77 years 8 months. His last illness began last October as heart trouble developed.

He received his early school training in Missouri, and at the age of 12 years came west with his folks, driving one of the ox teams across the plains to Canon City in 1863. To us this seems quite a feat for a boy of 12. But we look back with interest to those pioneer children as well as their fathers and mothers, for they were very brave, industrious and sturdy. The children early took their places in the great army that conquered the extensive wild area of this mighty land. He came to the Rifle Creek Community in March 1887. Here he lived continuously ever since. So for more than forty years he has taken manfully his place in the building up of this most excellent part of the state of Colorado.

Mr. George was united in marriage with Miss Clara V. Noble at the El Jebel ranch eight miles above Carbondale on March 18, 1886. To this union five children were born. Of the children one daughter, Annie L. passed away at the age of 12 years.

He is survived by his wife and four children and sixteen grand children. The children are Claude A., Harry N., Mrs. Margaret Brosius and Jasper, all of Rifle Creek. It is noteworthy that all his family was with him the last day of his life.

Mr. George had followed agriculture as a life work. Like most of our worthy pioneer group, he loved nature and God's great out-door. He was a man of kind and even temperament, ever ready to lend a helping hand, or give a cheering word. He was a true and loyal friend and greatly loved as husband and father. He will be mourned and missed by his community as well as his loved ones.

Funeral services were held at the Christian church Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock with Rev. A. N. Martin officiating. Mesdames J. Whitt and Harry Harp and Messrs Harold McKee and Claude Graham sang with Mrs. Eph Preontain at the piano. Interment is Rose Hill cemetery by Mortician Fred Sayer. Mr. George's funeral was one of the largest held in Rifle for some time.

One hundred twenty-nine years ago Alfred was born in Fulton, Calloway Co., Missouri into a family of above average financial and social position. He was raised in an environment of slave servants and ample money, with the family members, including the adolescent children having charge accounts at the local stores. He was to have said he knew little of his father other than that the old man around the place, was his father. His father was fifty-one when he was born. The death of the father and the Civil War caused the changes that led to the trek to Colorado Territory.

He traveled from Missouri with his mother, Margaret, sister Annie Love, half brother, John Anderson, two Negro women who had been slaves of his father, and a man named Jack Wiley, known as Uncle Jack. The trails end was in Canon City. This was in 1864, twelve years before Colorado became a state.

Facts about the time between arriving in Colorado and his marriage are hard to find. It is thought he drove a freight wagon for a time and for near certain he was a drover for Tom Goodnight. Whether or not he ever trailed a herd from Texas over the Goodnight trail is not known. In the summer of 1871 he was with a herd of cattle that was being ranged in the Tabernash area. This herd was to be taken to the Utah desert for the winter. When they started down the Yampa River they were caught in an early snow storm and stranded. With the feed all buried the drovers cut cottonwood trees for the cattle to feed on as they worked their way out. Considerable loss of the herd was incurred. It was during this time that his mother passed away in Denver and due to his predicament he was not aware of her death for many months. These were supposedly Goodnight cattle. By his statement, in The Progressive Men of Western Colorado story, for the next few years he rented land and ranched. Also in this story he stated his father and mother had eight children. This makes no sense to me. I find children by his parents totaling thirteen (counting half brothers and sisters) and if his parents had eight, six must have died young and the total would be seventeen. The next record I find is the 1880 census where he is in a gold camp at Gotham, in the company of Jack Wiley. The record says they are camped along the river.

After his marriage to Clara, he bought a herd of cattle and trailed them down the Colorado River to Rifle and summered them on the Flat Tops. He told of camping one night under the big red rock west of New Castle. Whether or not Greeley Brown was with him, as stated by Edna Sweet, I don't know but I think not. In the fall of 1886 this herd was trailed to the DeBeque area to be wintered. This herd was branded Lazy E 6 and the brand was registered to Clara V. George. He walked from the herd to Grand Junction, going around the toll gate on the Rhone Toll Road through DeBeque Canon, because he didn't have the money for the toll. The trip to Grand Junction was to be with his wife who was waiting the birth of their first child. Clara was staying with L. B. Johnson. (I will say more about the Johnsons in Clara's history.) This herd was mostly lost to the winter. Funds to buy the herd must have come from the sale of the El Jebel. In the spring of 1887 they headed for Rifle much as the previous stories have stated, living in the Worral cabin first. (The Worral cabin was located at a 1980 address of about 1700 Hwy. 325.) What cattle were left were grazed that summer on the Flat Tops. The next year he homesteaded on Middle Rifle Creek but didn't prove up. Greeley Brown did prove this property. It was about this time that Will Reed joined them and in partnership he and Will built the cow camp on the Flat Tops. This camp was on the upper end of a stream now know as George Creek. As before mentioned it was at this camp Will was murdered. Al was questioned as a suspect, being a business partner, and was unable to prove he had been at the lower place all day. The Sheriff was later able to determine where the shot had been fired from and decided Al's eyesight was so bad he could not have fired a shot from that distance with enough accuracy to do the job. He was pretty blind even this early in life. Clarence Reed, Will's son, being a boy at that time and with no mother, lived with Al and Clara mostly until grown.

To back up a little in time, in August of 1887 the Aspen militia was dispatched to Rio Blanco to aid in putting down some Indian problems. Al and Lige Parker must have been well known in the Aspen area because as the Militia passed through the area they looked them up and took them along as civilian assistants. The job of the civilians was to round up the Indian

ponies while the Militia took care of the Indians. The prize in the horse herd was an Indian race horse they called Colorow. Lige Parker managed to catch and keep him and raced him around the state for many years. All caught one he called Indian Mike that his children rode while they were growing up.

In 1890/1 G. W. Noble, Clara's father, purchased the land on lower Rifle Creek. (1980 address about 0170 Hwy. 325) It was on this place the children were raised. They farmed and raised cattle and horses. By 1906 they were raising sugar beets as a cash crop. A few seasons potatoes were raised, being bankrolled by his cousin's husband, Dr. George Hill, and friends from Denver. In 1892 G. W. Noble sold part of the farm to A. D. Raynard and in 1903 deeded his remaining interest to Clara V. George. It must be noted Al never had his name on the title of this land. Things went bad for them a number of years later and the farm was lost to creditors. They held a cattle and horse permit on the forest and there was a time when they had nothing in the way of stock to hold it with. A friend, McCamble, stocked this permit for a few years, but the permit was finally lost. (McCamble will be explained in the history attached to Clara).

During the years the family was growing up, he took out numerous hunting parties of Denver sportsmen. One summer was spent with him and the two oldest boys trailing a herd of milk cows north to the White River, through Axel Basin, east of the Yampa, over the top and down to the Colorado River and then back home to Rifle Creek. They milked the cows, selling milk and butter along the way. Another summer was spent skidding [splitting?] railroad ties out of the timber in the area top of Vail Pass. Claude and Harry were also with him on this trip and were about 12 and 7 years old. They rode the horses doing most of the actual skidding and Al cared for the camp for them and some other men. As the family grew and married there was little left of the farming operation except a few horses and some cows. This livestock was still in Clara's name and was cared for in partnership with the three sons. From this time on they lived in a number of houses up and down Rifle Creek, with his favorite one being the Wilder place.

(1980 address about 11466 Hwy. 325.)

The Wilder ranch, to him, was the most perfect place on earth to spend your life. During the later years of his life he became completely blind from cataracts and had never seen his grand children until after an operation about 1923. His hair was extremely curly, which he said was caused from nursing a mammie, and he cut it himself by pulling out the curls and cutting them off. He was very social and a fun lover, causing ridicule from his rather proper wife, but his response to her was "no fool-no fun". He seemed not to be a good manager but his life's experiences, if all known, would surely make a western TV series.12

He has conflicting death information of 1 Jun 1928. ¹³

Clara was claimed as an adopted daughter by Clement and Hester Johnson at the time of the 1880 census, He was a gardener in Fremont County, Colorado. He had come to Colorado from Monroe County, Iowa.

Mrs. Clara Armstrong died Thursday night, March 12, at 9 o'clock at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Herbert Brosius, on Rifle Creek. Mrs. Armstrong known to her many friends as "Grandma George" had been seriously ill since last Nov. when a paralytic stroke made it impossible for her to leave her bed. She suffered a third stroke before her death and lapsed into unconsciousness.

Clara Vincent Noble was born at Albia, IA, Sep. 4, 1860 and passed this life Mar 12, 1942, at the age of 81 years 6 months and 8 days. She was the daughter of G.W. and Marietta Noble. Her mother having passed away when she was yet an infant of 18 months. Her father passed away in 1912.

Clara came to Colorado at the age of 18 years. She was married to Alfred George, March 18, 1886 at Emma, Colorado [town no longer exists]. To this union five children were born; Claude, Annie (who passed away in 1901), Harry, Margaret and Jasper.

The family had resided on Rifle Creek since the year of 1887, a period of 55 years. Several years after the death of Mr. George, Mrs. George married Jack Armstrong of Grand Junction who passed away 6 months later.

Mrs. George is survived by her four children, 20 grandchildren and 8 great grandchildren, several nieces and nephews, and one sister, Fannie Manifold of Fort Morgan, Colorado. Her husband Alfred George, preceded her in death in 1928.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon, March 15, at the Christian church with Rev. Otto B. Duckworth officiating. In the choir were Mrs. Harry Harp and Mrs. Wm Fulton, who sang Sweet Hour of Prayer, The Old Rugged Cross, and In The Garden, with Robert MacIntosh at the organ. Interment was in Rose Hill Cemetery. Sayer Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Some More of the Story - by Gene Homer George (1986)

Clara was actually 17 months old when her mother died at child birth, leaving the father with two small daughters to raise. He remarried two years later. As an adolescent she didn't get along well with her stepmother, so as a young teenager she went to live with the Johnsons, and lived with them until grown.

Mr. and Mrs. Johnson were the parents of her father's first wife and no blood kin to her. Clara referred to them as Auntie and Uncle Johnson and they called her their adopted daughter, but none of this was legally so. The 1880 census lists Clement and Hester A. Johnson as their names but the Grand Junction Daily Sentinel calls him L. B. Johnson and calls Clara his niece. Willaim A. "Will" Reed was a son in law of the Johnsons. His wife was Alice A. Johnson Reed.

Clara grew up and was educated in the Monroe County schools. Her education was pretty good for that time, as the Albia school system was good enough to allow graduates to receive their teaching certificates. No record is found of Clara receiving hers, although her sister did.

In the spring of 1879 after she was 17 years old, she left with a wagon train from Iowa to Colorado. They traveled across the prairie ending up in Canon City. She said the wagons were heavily loaded and that she walked most of the way. She was traveling in the company of the Johnsons and Reeds and also among these Iowans was Josie Bitsenhauffer a childhood companion. Josie would remain a part of the rest of her life. Josie married McCamble and they settled in the mining town of Victor, and they are the ones mentioned in other stories in this text.

One story told, after their arrival in Colorado, was that of a picnic near Canon City. It seemed the young women were shopping for husbands, and a man was noted walking down the road toward the picnic. Clara said she told the girls "that one is mine". It turned out the man was Al George. In later years when Al was asked why it took so long for him to decide to marry her, he replied, "I had to wait for her to grow up". She was 17 and he was 26 at the time.

She lived a few years in Canon City, but no record shows of her being employed. She was living with the Johnsons during this time and Mr. Johnson worked as a gardener. The next record found she is listed with the early homesteaders on the Roaring Fork. Of the twenty or so listed she is the only woman. How this tiny little woman managed to prove up on a homestead is a mystery to me. Her land bordered that of William Harris, one of the earliest settlers and a brother to Charles Harris, the first settler on the Roaring Fork. William Harris made numerous attempts to get her to marry him, but she claimed all he wanted was her land. Charles Harris later married her sister Rose.

The homestead consisted of about 90 acres, and was sold for \$3,000.00 to H. B. Gillespie, a wealthy mining man from Aspen. The deed was made 26 May 1886 and recorded in Eagle Co. 10 Aug 1886. He built a dance hall there and got a post office designation. It was Gillespie that named the ranch The El Jebel. The present town of El Jebel came from this beginning. Gillespie went broke in Aspen as the mining failed and went to South America to try again. He was returning to the U.S., but died two days out and was buried at the expense of the ship line.

The cattle brought to the Rifle Creek area in 1886 were probably hers or cattle bought from the sale of the ranch. Records for this period are not very good and records are scattered from Aspen to Eagle to Glenwood and over to Gunnison, so accuracy is not as good as it should be. Many questions still exist. It is interesting to note the family's land and cattle was always held in her name.

One other story that is worthy of mention is that of her inheriting property in Paris, France. The story goes, that in the 1930's she received papers from a probate lawyer stating that she and other members of her family had inherited property in Paris. A check was made on the property and it was determined the cost to claim it was greater than the value, so nothing else was ever done. So far I have found no ancestry to France, but her mother's maternal grandparents are not yet found. Her given name Vincent will probably someday tell more of the story.²⁶

Clara Vincent Noble^{26,27,28,29,30,31,32} (F) was born on 4 Sep 1860 in Albia, Monroe County, Iowa, ²⁶ died on 12 Mar 1942 in Rifle, Garfield County, Colorado, ²⁶ at age 81, and was buried in Rose Hill Cemetery, Rifle, Garfield County, Colorado. ^{26,33} She was usually called Cad.

When Claude registered for the WWI draft on 5 Jun 1917, he was farming his own farm in Garfield County, Colorado. (Mailing address Rifle, Colorado). He had a wife and 4 children under 12 but did not claim an exemption. At the time of the 1920 census, Claude was a manager of a general farm in Austin, Garfield County, Colorado. He rented his home. The 1930 census showed that the family lived on a farm in Austin, Garfield County, Colorado. Claude was a farmer and owned his farm.

The Rife Telegram

Claude Alfred George, a long-time Rifle Creek rancher, died at Clagett Memorial Hospital Sunday afternoon after a long illness. He was born in Grand Junction in 1886.

His parents, Al and Clara Noble George, moved to the Rifle community in March 1887, where they settled on a ranch on Rifle Creek. He attended School on Rifle Creek, and in Rifle, and also attended the Colorado Agriculture College at Fort Collins.

In 1911 he moved to his ranch on Rifle Creek where he was engaged in the profession of farming and ranching until his retirement in 1958 when he and Mrs. George moved into Rifle.

He carried the U.S. Mail north of Rifle for one year in 1910.

He was united in marriage with Clarissa Mallory at her parents home at Antlers [near Rifle but no longer exists] on Nov. 30, 1911. Mrs. George passed away in August 1961.

Mr. George was a member of the Loyal Order of Moose with his membership in the Rifle Lodge where he was very faithful for many years. He took and active part in the community, serving as president of the Farmers Union, both the local and county units. He was an active member of the Rifle Creek Cattle Growers Association, serving as a member of its advisory board for many years; a county committeeman with the A.C.P., and president of the Garfield County Sugar Beet Growers Association. In 1950 he received the Skelly Oil award for superior achievement in agriculture.

I'd like to remind you again of the personnel of the Committee of Awards. These are the busy Agricultural leaders who select the farm people honored on this program. They are: Dean L. Blizzard, Oklahoma A. M. College; Prof. Gus Bohstedt, University of Wisconsin; Howard Gramlich, general agriculture agent, Chicago and North Western Railway System; Harry D. Linn, Iowa's Secretary of Agriculture; Dr. C. W. McCampbell, Kansas State College; Sam McCelvie, Nebraska rancher and Herford breeder; W. S. Moscrip, Minnesota dairyman and farm leader; Guy Noble, National Committee on 4-H Club Work, and R. C. Pollock, National Live Stock and Meat Board.

MURPHY

Once Colorado's first attraction was its gold deposits. There's still gold in "them that hills" but now two other sources of income are greater. Tourists come to see the State's 54 mountain peaks above 14,000 feet and to revel in as fine of scenic attractions as may be found. And agriculture, with two million irrigated acres, turn out values far exceeding the total take of the golden metal. Colorado is the ninth state in wheat yield, first in sugar beets, fourth in potatoes, twelfth in cattle numbers, and third among the states in numbers of sheep.

Skellymen are here in the "top o' the world" state. They supply quality motor fuels and lubricants to the men who run the ranches and the farms under water and to motorists on the states beautiful highways. We'll stop here in Garfield County, far northwest in the state. Theodore Roosevelt used to hunt bear and mountain lions here. Now 980 farms are laid out in the fertile valleys of the Colorado and its tributaries. Here melting snow from the surrounding mountains supply water to the fast growing crops. Alfalfa is the first production followed by potatoes, sugar beets, grain and fruit. On the mountain slopes are 60,000 sheep and 30,000 cattle. A very beautiful place Robert -- four hundred miles of fishing streams in the county. Mountain trout

For more that two years the Committee of Awards has known of the fine record of Claude A. George, in food production and in community service. When the Committee became concerned by its delay in getting here, County Agricultural Agent A.V. Lough assured them, saying, "there's no hurry. Mr. George has been here 38 years and everyone hopes he'll be here a long, long time yet. He's a permanent institution in Garfield County."

Mr. George owns 780 acres five and half miles north of Rifle, on the Colorado River. He has been on this farm since 1912. He and Mrs. George have raised 10 children and never failed to grasp every opportunity to serve the community and the county. They are very generous people.

Eight of the ten children have been 4-H'ers and four of the seven sons were in the armed forces during World War II. Of the ten, Annie lives in Rifle; Clarence and Ruth are both married and in Denver; Clyde is married and running his own ranch north of his father's 780; Florence is married and living on a ranch east of Rifle; Walter, married, runs a farm east of Rifle; Burt, married, helps with the home place; Bill is in college under the G.I. Bill and Gene and Dale are at home, Gene helping on the farm and Dale attending high school and putting in his summers on the land.

MURPHY

What a remarkable family, all doing a good job.

BURLINGHAM

They could have all stayed at home on the farm. There's work enough. Of the 780 acres, 480 are in dry land pasture and 300 irrigated. There's work Crops include 12 acres of sugar beets, 14 acres of potatoes, 24 of silage corn, 23 of wheat, 14 of oats, 70 acres of irrigated pasture and enough of the rest in alfalfa that the annual cut exceeds 300 tons -- green, luscious legume hay. Livestock includes about 90 feeder calves and 35 hogs fattened during the winter and 200 stock cattle.

From now on Mr. George plans to have less acreage in row crops and to enlarge his pasturing and feeding of livestock. To help maintain the soil, crested wheat grass is sown, 400 tons of manure are hauled to the plowed land, green manure is plowed under and crops are rotated so that legumes go on each field at least one year in five.

MURPHY

May I say a word for Mrs. George? She plays quite a big part, not only on the farm but in the community.

BURLINGHAM

Glad if you will. Go ahead.

MURPHY

It does occur to me that rearing ten children could be something of a chore. Mrs. George had much of that job -- and all of the ten have done all right. Mrs. George, says County Agent Lough, is also a real partner in the operation on the farm. She has a large vegetable garden and cans a great deal of food. Also she raises 100 chickens and 40 to 50 turkeys just to have something to do.

She has served as president and secretary of her community Home Demonstration Club and in fifteen years has attended all but one of its meetings. She was chosen as county president of the Home Demonstration Council in 1946 and in 1947 was District President of ten counties.

BURLINGHAM

Robert, put my name on the list of those who cannot understand how people can do so much as Claude and Clarissa George accomplish.

Mr. George is president of the Farmers Union, has been president for 25 years of the company through which he receives his irrigation water, is a member of the Forestry Advisory Board of the Cattle Growers Association, has been president or secretary of the Sugar Beet Growers Association for 25 years, was long a member of the potato growers association, is a member of the Garfield County Planning Committee, served on the weed control committee for four years; for 10 years has been a member or chairman of the county or community committee for the Triple A, was a member of the committee which introduced R.E.A. to the county and was on the potato control committee in 1949 and again this year.

MURPHY

I'm tired -- just listening to the list.

BURLINGHAM

I don't see why the Georges aren't worn out. But they keep on the ball. Their neighbors and other friends have come together in Rifle this morning to honor Claude and Clarissa George for the fine things they have done. As they all breakfast together in the Christian Church, Mr. Skelly's personal representative's extend Mr. Skelly's congratulations and best wishes and present the Agricultural Achievement Award to Claude A. George, on the unanimous vote of the Committee of Awards, the Award including a \$100 United States Saving Bond, a Gold lapel pin and a handsome scroll.

MURPHY

Next Saturday at this same time another W.G. Skelly Agricultural Achievement Award will be made. Meantime, take advantage of the service offered by your Skelly Tank Station man and your Skelgas dealer. They're good men to know.

Annie Clara George's life written by herself - up to about 1980

I was born on Rifle Creek, five and one half miles north of Rifle, in a cabin. My parents were hard working people. We were poor, but everyone was in the same boat. At the time of my birth my parents were leasing 120 acres, which they soon bought. Uncle Harry, Dad's brother, married Mama's sister soon after by birth. They farmed together. Times were hard and prices cheap. The general store gave credit between crops.

My grandparents lived near by. They had two kids at home. Aunt Margaret had finished teachers normal as it was called in those days. I started to school. The building still stands. It is the club house now. Grandpa was blind. Grandma was a good cook and a wonderful house keeper and she sewed a lot. In those days we made everything we wore.

I started to School to Aunt Margaret in the fall on 1918. The next year Rifle Creek consolidated with Rifle. The district bought a bus which I rode twelve years.

Bud started to school the second year the bus ran. It was hard. The road was rough and narrow. We left at eight in the morning and got back at five. The bus was cold.

By the time I was nine years old there were seven of us kids, five boys and three girls. The first World War was being fought. Prices were high.

We had a good life at home. Every one worked and played hard. We had lots of friends. Santa Clause was always on time with something for everybody. One year he brought a little farm wagon. He brought me a rag doll. Santa always ate some pie. One time he brought a real pony. We named her Fannie. She had a will of her own. She could really dump you.

Time passed each year with its joys and sorrows, but it seemed we got through it all. All of our children diseases. Florence had whooping cough bad. Clyde had a hard time with measles.

Dad had a spell of rheumatism. He was in bed for a year. Uncle Harry did the farming. Dad finally got to where he could get around on crutches. He did some work for the county.

The next spring in April another brother. When Bill was about two, Mama had a gallstone operation which was a bad one. She went to the hospital in Glenwood. In those days Glenwood was a long hard trip. A neighbor and Grandma took care of us kids and the canning.

One Sunday, Dad took us girls up to see Mama. It was a long slow trip. It was the first time I had eaten a meal in town. It was a long time before Mama was able to work.

I entered high school in the fall of 1928. Grandpa had one of his eyes operated on. He could see us kids for the first time. School had always been an ordeal for me. I couldn't enter any of the activities which made it rough. Bud entered the next year and Clyde the next, but neither graduated. There wasn't any money anywhere. Many banks closed their doors, farm products were cheap.

Dad and the boys milked twelve or fifteen cows. We shipped the cream which bought the groceries we needed. We sold eggs and a few turkeys. All of us kids were 4-H members. There were lots of kids on the creek. We had all attended Sunday School in the old school house. We also had many neighborhood dances. Our parents would attend too. We would take sandwiches and make coffee in a wash boiler. Some of the neighbors would play. We had many Thanksgiving dinners where the whole community shared in dinner, games, supper and dance.

There was plenty of work for everyone at home. For years, us kids had a beet patch we attended. In the fall we got the money. I used to feel so badly because I wasn't strong enough to work in the beet field, but there was plenty of dishes to be washed. Dad and Uncle Harry bought a gasoline washer. We pulled it on a stone boat between two homes. This was a big help because we had big washings.

The years passed. We had another brother. Graduation came. I was glad it was over. We were still living in the old house. Another brother came to live with us. Ruth graduated from high school and went to nurses training that fall. Bud went out to see what the world was made of. I thought the folds had struggled long enough. There just wasn't money enough so that they could go and do some of the things they wanted to do. Eight kids was a big family but as time went on I found out what real joy those last three became to them.

I hardly knew what to do with myself. There was plenty of work to do, but I wanted more. I could sew, which I did. I had a horse to ride. I had lots of friends, but most of them were getting married to have families. Grandpa died. Grandma lived in a little house near by and I spent a lot of time with her. It was empty time and wasted days.

I forgot to tell of the canyon which was about ten miles up the creek. It is a lovely place. Grandma and Grandpa lived at the falls several years. It was a real treat to go up there. Sometimes we would pack a lunch and spend the day picnicking. We always enjoyed the big trees, cool grass and the crystal clear stream of water. Just beyond the canyon is where we ran the cattle in the summer. It was an effort to got up there, so many things had to be done before we could go and so many jobs when we returned.

As time passed we continued our labor on the ranch. Prices higher. We bought another 160 acres. We hired several men, raised more cattle, hay and corn. About this time Dad decided to run for county commissioner but he lost the election.

The basement of the new house was dug and little by little Dad's dream of a new house came true. The talk of a second world war was beginning. Draft boards were being set up. All the men and boys had to register. Ration books appeared. Clyde was among the first to go. Burt and Walter got married. We had been in the new house for a couple of years. It was great, so nice and warm. We sure enjoyed it. We had a pump in the kitchen and a big basement for our fruit

At this time, I decided to go to Grand Junction to see if I could work for wages. I got several jobs but I couldn't do it. I returned soon after Pearl Harbor. The war got worse. Walter and Burt were both called, each leaving a family. In due time Bill and Gene joined the Navy. Dale was called after the war was over.

Grandma had moved to Rifle where she lived for a few years. I spent a lot of time with her. She had several strokes. Aunt Margaret took her out to her home where she died. I sure missed Grandma. She was a wonderful lady.

Before Burt left for the service, I went with him to a dance on Divide Creek. I met a man, we liked each other. He lived with his father on Divide Creek. They had a ranch and ran cattle. Albert was twenty years older than me. We were married on my thirtieth birthday. They owned one of the better homes. We lived in a little house in the back. The spring after we got married Dad Hansen's cook got married, so we moved into the main house. I had plenty of work. The men were good to me and we had everything we wanted. We raised a big garden. I canned everything, of course we didn't have much sugar. The war still went on. We made trips to Denver each fall to ship the cattle. We stayed in hotels which was a real treat for me, because I had never slept in a hotel before. I had been in Denver a few times to

see Ruth and Bud who lived there. They were both married and had families. I enjoyed the big stores and theaters.

We didn't have electricity on the ranch yet. We had a battery radio. I saw my first T.V. set in a store window.

The war was over. The boys came home. One of our cousins was missing. He was never found.

With all of this, think of the changes we saw in Rifle and on the creek. New cars, new homes, new stores. But I learned things were nothing to what the next few years would bring. Neighbors drifted apart, even families didn't see each other very often. We did all get home once. All of us under Dad's roof. It was great.

I only wish I had the word power and wisdom to describe the feeling I had for the people on Rifle Creek the first thirty years of my life. They were great people. My life as Mrs. Hansen went on. The many things we did, cattle raising became difficult. The date to turn them out became later each year, the time to bring them in earlier. Good farm help was hard to get. An old friend of the family came and Dad Hansen hired him.

We had been married three years when I became pregnant and had an operation which I came through with flying colors. Within a few weeks I was doing the work again. I always did more canning than was necessary.

Before the war was over, Albert and I went on a trip to California. It was a nice trip. I was kind of disappointed because I just saw more mountains. I did enjoy the ocean and the big waves.

Spring came again on Divide Creek. Spring is a hard time of the year. Water is so short. You work so hard to get over the hay as fast as you can.

That fall Albert began to fail. The doctor said he had to have a gallstone operation. The operation was a success but the cancer claimed him the next March.

Afer his death, I moved back to my old room and my old way of life. It had been a little over five years. I want to add this. Bill pulled me out of Hansen's at noon and R.E.A. electricity was turned on that afternoon. Rifle Creek didn't have any yet.

Dick, Dad Hansen's only son, moved into the house with Dad. This arrangement didn't work out very well. So one day Dad phoned me and asked if he could buy a house in Rifle, would I keep house for him? I said yes. He bought a nice brick house and we fixed it up and made a nice home. We continued to go to Denver each fall. Our next door neighbors were people I had known all of my life. I could spend time with them. I joined some of the clubs and lodges. I had joined the Rifle Creek club in 1933. I am still a member. The old family friend Art Rule came to visit often.

Soon after I moved to town, Florence began to fail in health. She had an attack of rheumatic fever which impaired her heart and was in bed for several months. Mama took care of her day and night. The folks finally took her to Denver. She improved and soon could get around, even drive her car. Her and Arilis were divorced and she was miserable. She died a few years later and never gave up loving her husband.

Aunt Margaret died about this time. She had lived to see her family grown.

The young boys had chosen wives. I forgot to tell you about the wonderful wife Clyde had brought home from Texas. She has been so good to me. She is a wonderful person. Burt and Clyde run the ranches. Burt has three kids, Clyde two

Cattle prices are good. Everyone has a new car. The talk of T.V. has hit the country. I saw one in Denver and wondered what it would be like to own one. Even Rifle Creek has electricity. I had an electric sewing machine which was my pride and joy. Dad Hansen was getting old but he still drove his car. One day in May he helped Dick drive the cattle to the pasture. He came home and become unconscious during the night and he slipped away the next morning without a word for anyone. I got an estate from him and soon married Art Rule.

We went to Silt to live. My life there was very wonderful. Art was good to me and the community accepted me. We joined the church, Lions Club and the lodge. We had a cute little house and a garden patch and enough to live on. We

were janitors for the church and the lodge hall. I went through the lodge there. One of the best friends I ever had lived there. In all it was a good life. Then we decided to sell the house. I don't know why people do things like that. How many times I have wished I still owned it.

The prices skyrocketed. Dad got a big offer for the old home, so the folks retired. They bought a house in Rifle. In fact, they bought next door to where I had lived. He remodeled and it was real nice but it didn't seem like home. Dad was so unhappy in Rifle. The first summer he took a job riding for the Pool on Rifle Creek. Mama raised a big garden in the back.

Clyde bought a little country store and also got a job in Rifle. Walter owned a ranch. Burt bought a dude ranch. Gene was the only one left on Rifle Creek and he worked in Rifle. Dale decided to be a heavy equipment driver so he bought a trailer home where he could live.

While all this was happening I seemed to be having more trouble. Little things disappeared around Silt. To my sorrow I found out it was Art. I was so embarrassed, because nothing like this had ever happened to me before. It was unbelievable. We soon got a divorce. We were living in a trailer then.

I got a job taking care of three kids. The parents were separated. The mother worked. The hours were long and difficult. The children missed their parents. They weren't old enough to know what it was all about. I worked two years.

Mama had needed an operation for a long time. She decided to have it so I went home to be with Dad while she was in the hospital. It proved to be a real serious operation. She again had a hard struggle. At the end of one month Mama died.

No one will ever know what a loss I suffered. Others had always gotten rough with me when I got so lonely. The only person I could turn to was gone. Dad was a wonderful man full of honor and respect for his family and fellow man. Each of us in our own way tried to find comfort without Mama. If she had taken care of herself sooner, but she always thought of others. It was God's will. We did find some happiness together. Dad needed a cook or someone in the home. I sold the trailer to a niece that just got married. I hated to leave my friends in Silt.

The years passed. Dad had a stroke then another that paralyzed his left hand and did some brain damage. He hired a man, a friend of ours to stay with us (Troy Morgan) to drive the truck for him. Troy fixed a camper on the truck. He took Dad to the hills. We all went to Yellow Stone Park. They went to Frontier Days. He had the Moose Lodge, he joined when I was a little girl. Dad got a lot of pleasure out of the lodge. In the fall he had his first operation. Troy couldn't stay any more so we hired a woman. Each month he got worse and finally the doctor said he had a cancer. He was so sick and depressed.

While all of this was going on several nieces and nephews got married and started families. The niece that bought my trailer took it to Climax and in a little while she bought a new one. She had just lived in it a few months when it burned down. Their two kids and another child burned with it.

Sister Ruth's health was beginning to fail. All of the brothers were doing good.

Dad finally got so we could bring him home. We hired a practical nurse to stay with him. Little by little he got worse. The doctor hadn't got all of the cancer.

I started to got with and old friend of mine. His wife had been dead for several years. We had a good time. Bert Randolph was his name. I had know him all my life. We were both so lonesome. He owned a nice car. You see the nurse had taken all duties. I couldn't do anything to suit her. Just sew for myself.

Dad lived until June. He was like Mama, had a hard death. Bert and I were married soon after Dad's death. We spent the summer in our beloved canyon. Bert was so much a part of it and it will always be a little bit of heaven to me.

I am not going to write about the next five years of my life because I want to write about the changes in Rifle and my beloved creek.

The old time families are all gone. The older ones dead. My generation has moved away to find better jobs. Our old home has been sold and re-sold. There is a golf course just above our home. The Fish and Game owns lots of the canyon. They made lots of campsites with fireplaces and tables. There is a fish hatchery at the mouth of the canyon and a big lake just inside the gap.

There are lots of changes in Rifle, new homes, a nursing home, a hospital, and two new schools.

Now I'm going to put my story away. Some day I may add to it. I had great pleasure in writing it. I hope who ever reads it will enjoy it. If I have made it sound like I had a rough life, I really haven't, only lots of it hasn't been what I would have liked it to have been.

It is 1980 now. I lived in the trailer about four years after Bert's death. I went a lot and I also played cards.

Oil shale being thought of again. The Navy had been experimenting with it a few years back. Rifle really boomed. Home after home was being built. A large trailer court and another large school and a large City Market.

I spent two summers with Burt at his guest ranch cleaning cabins and helping with meals. It was hard work but I sure enjoyed it.

The second fall I took a trip to Neveda. Aunt Ida and Uncle Harry lived out there. Uncle Harry was in bad shape. I went by bus. I stayed the weekend with Bert's nephew in Ogden. We had grown up knowing each other. He had a nice wife and family. We sure had a good time.

I spend a lot of time sewing and going to clubs and lodge and playing cards.

Rifle was sure growing. So many new people. Prices were going up.

Two years ago Troy lost his wife. She had a cancer. She sure had a struggle.

About this time there was talk of a senior housing project being built. I put my name in for one. In November I moved in. I have three rooms and a bath. The rent on the trailer space was so high and with high prices of gas and electricity and groceries, living was high. There are eight buildings up here. Four units in each building. There is a center building where the office is and a big room for parties and meetings. There is a man who takes care of it. There have been two deaths, one marriage, one went to a nursing home and two moved away.

Soon after I moved, I fell and broke my hip. I was all winter getting over that.

In August I had my teeth pulled. I have been sick all winter. I don't seem to get them to fit. 46

He made it without incident but said it was certainly a lesson in fear.

loose all of her hair and her legs drew up into a fetal position. Her body wasted away to under 90 pounds. After a time it seemed she had overcome the illness and needed therapy to regain her mobility and strength so she was taken from her parents home where she had been cared for and sent to Denver to the hospital. The recovery was almost amazing and in a few months she was home, ready to resume her life.

Gene was a family historian and spent many years researching the George/Mallory and Hall/Renbarger family lineages and computerizing this information to be published in a book. Other hobbies include gardening and years earlier Gene had his private pilot's license. Gene was a member of the Loyal Order of the Moose.

Gene was born at the family ranch on Rifle Creek. He was not well known by many of his siblings as a boy, but they all became close as adults. As the family gathering the few days before Gene's funeral, many incidences from their childhood and adult years have been remembered. Gene's one remaining sister, Annie, remembers how he was always there to take care of her, especially in the last several years. The brothers, Bud, Burt, Walter, Bill, and Curly, have related several instances that covered Gene's life from Burt remembering being sent to the barn to do the milking and then standing in front of the log house waiting to see his new baby brother, to the long talks all of the brothers had in

Margie would take the wagon over to the George house, pick Gene up, and take him back to the "Brown House" so she could "take care of him" for the day. Gene was not known for his love of horses, but Walter and Burt remember Gene's horse Freckles and the trying times he and Freckles had. He did enjoy riding when he went riding with Hazel and her girlfriends. His natural mechanical ability created an unending supply of gadgets, widgets, and assorted goods as well as many ingenious contraptions. Curly remembers rebuilding the engine to the 1936 Chevy using the potato cellar as a garage and at one point resorted to using the block as a hammer. Gene's interest in flying was sparked by brother Bill and proved to be a source of enjoyment for him and Phyllis. Gene, being slightly older than some of the nieces and nephews, Bud sheepishly remembers conning him into watching several of them so that the adults could go out in the evening. Gene was generously paid for this service by Bud taking him to the Stock Show the next day.

Saturday evening get-togethers and holiday parties with the Kizers and Rydens, picnics up Rifle Creek, and arrowhead hunting with Cyril Murphy were occasions of special enjoyment for Gene, Phyllis, and the kids. While living in Denver, favorite Sunday outings were flying and hunting for spent ammunition shells with his family and friends.

In the last twelve years Gene and Phyllis enjoyed taking "almost four-wheel drive" trips to look at the wildflowers and scenery, listen to the birds, and search for the perfect piece of retirement property. Gene enjoyed looking at undeveloped pieces of property and visualizing how it could be developed. Many hours were spent while at the office complex "holding up the building" and discussing every subject that came up with friend Bob. Gene was always eager to listen to or talk with anyone who had the time, whether they were an old friend or a new acquaintance.

Gene's grandchildren provided endless hours of pride and joy. Each one was special in their own right and loved by Papa and Grandma equally.

Sarah thrilled Gandpa when she gave her first flute solo on Christmas Eve in 1986. That same Christmas, Ruth sweet-talked Grandpa out of his brown western tie, so she could wear it and "be like Grandpa". Stephen Daniel took considerable joshing from Grandpa as he was always the first one to the table if he knew that there would be "the brown stuff", Grandma's homemade apple butter, as part of the meal. His granddaughter, Bonnie Faith, was born last March; it was not possible for them to go see her.

Clarissa surprised Papa and the rest of the family last spring by keeping the full extent of her part in the school play "Annie Get Your Gun" a secret. In the course of the play, Clarissa launched into a song and dance routine that no one in the family had any hints about. As Papa sat in total amazement, shaking his head, Clarissa did an excellent job of her performance. Gordon was Papa's "Dusty Sidekick" and they spent many hours fixing stuff, including a long awaited bicycle bought from the Salvation Army for two dollars. Gordon had the bicycle loaded into the pickup before Papa could finish paying for it. Papa wanted to make sure Gordon had a strong male influence, someone to look up to and admire, and someone to teach him all the "man things" a boy should know.

Papa had many special memories of "Sir Clayton", but the one that almost brought tears to his eyes was when Clayton showed Papa, before anyone else, that he could walk on his tip-toes, forward and backwards, when three years earlier no one was certain he would ever walk.

Gene was always a kind and understanding father that was there to offer advice and moral support when it was needed. All of his children were given the encouragement to be their own person and to follow their own paths in life. No one could have had a better father or friend.

Gene was Phyllis' life and her love, more than just a husband, he was her best friend. Their life together was filled with love and the memories that remain will be a golden treasure never to be forgotten.

As we have heard so far, family was the mortar of his life that held all the pieces together as a whole. His desire was to publish a text containing the family ancestry and history compiled over the years, for future generations of the George/Mallory family. This project will be completed, as Gene would have wanted.

The family wishes to thank all of you for being his friend and for sharing this time with us.

(High-tech sleuth tracks ancestors, Dave Fishell) Some folks may walk into the Ancestor Shop expecting to purchase an exciting great-grandfather or an infamous great-great aunt who will add some color to the family tree. But when you walk through the door of the office at 1460 North Ave., to view the glowing computer screen, microfilm readers and rows of books, the owner, Gene and Phyllis George, can offer you information only on real-life ancestors. The shop has been in business just a few months, but already the Georges have helped people track down elusive distant cousins, unknown great-great great-grandparents and long-gone ancestors across the country.

The heart of The Ancestor Shop is a small Leading Edge computer and a powerful yet simple to use genealogical computer program that Gene developed and had a local computer expert program into his machine. The program not only guides you through each step needed to fill out your family tree, but the computer's word-processing functions and memory also keep paperwork and duplication to a minimum.

"My wife and I have been family historians for the last 12 years," said Gene. "And when we, or anyone else, were tracking down our ancestor, we'd end up with this big scrapbook full of little pieces of paper and notes. And if you did get around to filling out a family history book, just about the time you were done, you'd find some new information, and you'd have to start all over again. The computer eliminates all those notes and papers, and if you do have to add some new information to the family book, it's easy to do."

When a customer first comes into The Ancestor Shop, Gene develops a file for him and then has the computer guide him through the first steps of filling out the family tree. "Even if a person doesn't have any idea where to start, we can help them," said Gene. "Everyone knows what their own birthday is, and most folks know about their parents and grandparents, aunts and uncles and other close relatives. We'll start with information like that, and fill in all the blanks we can." "Then we'll print out the chart that will show the person what information he needs to start looking for. They can go out and talk to relatives and search for documents and records, and when they get some new information, they can come back here and we'll fill out more of the blanks. We'll keep going until we get the whole story." If a person doesn't know how or where to start looking for documents, birth and death records and other information relating to their relatives, Gene and Phyllis can help there, too.

They have a small, but expanding, library of books on genealogy and history, as well as local burial records on microfilm. For an additional fee, the shop also can get copies of historic and family records on file at the massive American Genealogical Lending Library in Bountiful, Utah. According to Gene, there are several commercial genealogical computer programs on the market, but he said none has the capability of simply rewriting or re-editing family information already stored in the computer file. "My program is easy to use," said Gene. The program seems to work well. It took Gene only a few seconds to call up his own family history chart, which told about his

grandparents moving to Rifle in 1887, and his father moving to Antlers in 1911, and later ranching along Rifle Creek.

Fees at the Ancestor Shop vary, with the first visit costing just a few dollars. Cost go up with increased use of the computer. Although the computer and Gene's program are the heart of The Ancestor Shop, the machine is also one of the business' biggest drawbacks. "So many people come in here wanting to find out about their family, but they are scared of the computer," said Gene. "They think they can't run it, that it takes all sort of special training. I tell them that if they can type and follow directions, we can help them run the computer and start learning about their family's past in just a few minutes."

(Genealogy buffs digging up data on county's past - Bryan Gallegos) Phyllis George looks intently over cemetery records, and smiles.

No, she's not a ghoul who gets a kick out of hanging around cemeteries. George is a member of the Mesa County Genealogical Society, which is conducting a cemetery inventory. George, her eyes twinkling and smiling from ear to ear, is happy because the grueling, seven-year project is almost over.

"It hasn't been a piece of cake," George said. "I'm looking forward to it being done." George said the project will help preserve local history. The society, which has roughly 35 members working as volunteers, is compiling a 100-year cemetery record of the burials in Mesa County. When the leg work is done and the data formulated in a book, the society hopes to publish it. In the early 1980's the society visited all 27 cemeteries in Mesa County and recorded all the names from every tombstone. They put those names on cards for the Museum of Western Colorado. The museum will also have a master list when the project is completed, George said. Last year, the society began entering those names in a computer. By using the computer, George said, it will be easier to compile a master list. They will also have an easier time editing the copy, said George, Phyllis' husband, who also volunteers.

The tombstone reading was completed a couple of years ago, Phyllis said. Now the society concentrates on compiling a list of names from unmarked graves in the 27 cemeteries. She said several volunteers go out every Monday for a few hours, and examine cemetery records to find names of people buried in the unmarked graves. Right now the society has on the computer a list of roughly 28,000 name of people buried in Mesa County since 1892. Next year, when George anticipates the project will be done, there will be an additional 2,000 names on the list. "We're about half way through the Orchard Mesa cemeteries, as far as picking up unmarked graves," George said. Additional cemeteries in the outlying areas of Grand Junction still need to be reviewed, she added.

Although she admits that she would like to spend her time doing different things, George said she and the others will keep working on the project until its completion. "It's kind of like an itch that you want to scratch," George said, "But you can't until you're done (working)." You don't work on a project diligently for seven years without enjoying it a little bit, and George admits that she has enjoyed it. "You get involved in the different people buried out there," she said. "There's a story behind all of them." She said that by looking at the list, she can see history unfold. For example, Phyllis said, she could tell without looking at the burial dates, when the women's movement took place. She said before the 1920's, when women were buried, their first names were never used in cemetery records. But when the women's movement began in the 1920's, records show that cemetery managers began listing women by their full names, not just their last names.

You do get to see some history," agreed Gene George. But the project has caused some frustration. Phyllis said the enthusiasm of the society comes and goes, which makes it rough at times. Additionally, Phyllis is frustrated by the number of unmarked graves. Gene George, after taking a look on the computer, said there are roughly 5,000 unmarked graves in Mesa County.

"We just feel like it's a shame that those people do not have a tombstone," Phyllis said. She added that those buried without a tombstone are often forgotten forever. The list and subsequent book will ensure that those buried in unmarked graves will not be totally forgotten.

In addition to the project, the Mesa County Genealogical Society is sponsoring a Genealogy Workshop Tuesday at the E.L. Bacon Room of United Bank, 359 Main St. The seminar will feature two sessions, running 1-5 p.m. and 6-10

p.m. The workshop fee is \$17.

Letter received 2009 from Tony George with information about his dad, Alfred Walter George (Sept 1, 1914 - Nov 8, 1991)

Dad was born in Rifle, Colorado and attended public school there. My earliest recollections of him are at the time that we moved onto the "Thurston" place in "Antlers Valley". This would have been in the summer of 1944. He and his father (Harry N. George) were farming and the big crop was Sugar Beets which were harvested and sold. We also raised corn which was chopped into silage and fed to the livestock. They purchased another property between Rifle and Meeker in approximately 1948 to be used as summer grazing for cattle. The Thurston place was used to produce alfalfa hay to feed the cattle in the winter. Dad found work in Rifle to supplement the farm income. He was a good mechanic and preferred this type of work to farming. When he retired in 1978, his vision was so poor that he would not drive the car. He was able to get treatment for the cataracts and other problems and enjoyed fairly good vision in later years. He and Mom retired to some

Clara Margaret George was born February 15, 1894 on Rifle Creek. She attended schools but was graduated from high school at Victor. She was united in marriage to John Herbert Brosius June 16, 1920. To this union three children were born, one of whom Ellery, was killed in service in 1945 while piloting a P-38 in the South Pacific.

Mrs. Brosius taught school on Rifle Creek for 5 years and served one year as emergency teacher during the war. She was past president of the American Legion Aux., the Farmers Union and the Rifle Creek Extension Club.

Mrs. Brosius is survived by her husband and two children, Mrs. Mary Margaret Head of Odessa, Tex., and Willard Brosius of Rifle; brothers Claude, Harry and Jasper George all of Rifle, and three grandchildren. Her parents Alfred and Clara George preceded her in death.

28 Jun 1892 in Aspen, Pitkin County, Colorado, ^{228,262} died on 7 Jan 1974 in Grand Junction, Mesa County, Colorado, ^{228,263,264} at age 81, and was buried in Rose Hill Cemetery, Rifle, Garfield County, Colorado. ^{239,265} They had three children: **George Ellery, Mary Margaret**, and **Herbert Willard**.

The marriage was performed by H. Ralph Bixel of Rifle, Colorado. The witnesses signing the marriage license were Anis Turner and Jasper George. Fanny Anis Turner was Clara's one-half first cousin. Jasper was her brother.

On the 1900, 1910, 1920, 1930, 1940 and 1950 census Herbert was listed in the community of Austin, Garfield County, Colorado. He was a farmer in the earlier census. In 1950, he was listed as a rancher. In the earlier censuses he was shown as part of his father's household. In 1930, his father was shown as part of his household. By 1940, his father had gone to live in the Winchester Hotel in Rifle, Garfield County, Colorado. Herbert continued to farm. He had completed the 4th year of high school. Herbert was widowed in 1949. In 1950, his youngest son, Herbert Willard, daughter-in-law Gladys, and newborn granddaughter Diana were living with him on the ranch.

When Herbert registered for the WWI draft on 5 Jun 1917, he was a farmer on the home farm in Rifle, Garfield County, Colorado. He was single.

During the second world war, Herbert and brother in law Claude George supplied the army with 6 train cars of potatoes from their adjacent farms. They raised a very tender potato called a Double Red McClure---it was delicious to eat and had a lot of flavor. It isn't raised anymore as it had to be harvested by hand because it skinned up so easily. Herbert was well known for the potato and the army heard about it.

The big brick house his father John Ellery Brosius had built burned down. This Aug 2010 report is from his son Herbert Willard Brosius: "The house burned down twice--the first time was on my father's birthday--I'm not sure which one-- my mother built a big fire to heat the oven to make him a birthday cake and soot in the chimney caught on fire sending sparks up the chimney and setting a fire on the roof----since it was such a big house we never had a ladder tall enough to get up there to put it out and the house burned down. I must have been 10 or twelve years old as I remember helping J P Richardson rebuild the house. (Note: the 1940 census showed that the house the family lived in was valued at \$10. Willard was 11 then. The family was probably living in the log cabin during that time.)

The house was burned down again by a guy that had stolen a lot of things out of it. His name was Gerald Lane and I went to school with him. He and his wife were living in the log house at the time and his car was seen by the neighbors as leaving the ranch just before someone saw smoke across the valley and the house was burning. No one was home at the time except him and his wife. The couple had gone to Las Vegas and we never saw them again-- the story is Lane was a gambler and got in trouble there and some one killed him. I think I was working for the oil shale plant and my dad was on a hunting trip down Peance creek when the house was burned down."

Second Lieutenant George Ellery Brosius was reported missing in action over the Celebies islands on 5 Jun 1945 by the War Dept.

I was cultivating potatoes on my fathers farm north of Rifle , Colo with a team of horses called Jack and Nig when my sister came out to the field by the red house to tell me of the telegram.

Ellery always told me never to worry as if he got shot down he'd 'Walk Back". I never grieved until it was painfully evident he was never coming back. The War Dept declared him dead a year later.

Scotty as his friends in the service called him had 69 combat missions to his credit with his P38 airplane and was due to be rotated back to the states when asked to ferry some new planes to the combat zone. His plane developed engine failure in one engine and the feathering mechanism wouldn't engage causing the plane to circle. His wing commander stayed with him until low fuel forced him and the others to go on.--I'm just sure he told them to "Go on I'll walk back". They were over open water near the Island of Barneo and there was a tropical storm raging. In those days the P38 was called the flying coffin because it was almost impossible to bail out of it.It was only later they developed the ejection seat.-------Will Brosius

Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Brosius received a telegram from the War Department Thursday morning, stating that their son Second Lieutenant George Ellery was missing in action as of June 5, somewhere in the South Pacific.

Lt. Brosius was based in the Philippines as a pilot on a P-38. The last letter the parents received was written about May 30. In this letter he states he had 70 hours and 30 minutes combat flying time to his credit.

In February of 1943 while he was attending A M College at Fort Collins he was called to the service and sent to the Army Air Force technical training at Jefferson Barracks, Missouri. Finishing this course he was sent to Calif. for advanced training and graduated at Chandler Field, Ariz. in April 1944.

His parents went to Ariz. to see their son receive his wings and also to attend his wedding. He brought his bride here for a visit during his furlough, following graduation. The wife then went to the home of her parents at Garnavillo, Iowa. On March 16 a son was born to Lt. Brosius and his wife. Mrs. Herbert Brosius left Saturday night for Garnavillo, to spend the next few weeks with the young wife and baby.

A number of our boys who were reported missing in action, were later reported safe. We truly hope this will be the case with this young man, who so bravely went to fight for our country.

Monday morning the Brosius family received word from the War Department to the effect that Lt. Brosius had gone down over the Celebese Island. The P-38 is a one man fighter plane.

He was called by his middle name, Ellery, by the family. His wife called him Georgie. Another of his nicknames was Bumps.

George Ellery Brosius from Joe and Trish Marak of Grand Junction, CO Research

Second Lieutenant (2Lt.) George Ellery Brosius, son of John Herbert and Clara Margaret (George) Brosius, was born on September 17, 1922 at Rifle, Colorado, in Garfield County. George's forefathers mined the mountain region near Leadville, Colorado in the late 1800's.

In the "Great War," George's father John, a farmer from Rifle, was inducted into the U.S. Army where he served as a corporal in the Field Artillery Corps. After the war, John returned home to Garfield County where he returned to farming the fertile Colorado River Valley near Rifle.

George attended Rifle schools and following graduation in the spring of 1940, went on to study at Mesa College in the fall of 1940. The college was located in nearby Grand Junction, Colorado, in Mesa County. While a sophomore,

George lived at 208 Grand Avenue in Grand Junction. Also during his sophomore year, George enrolled in the Civil Aeronautics Authority Civilian Pilot Training Program in the winter of 1942. He graduated from Mesa College on Friday, May 29, 1942.

When war came, George volunteered for duty as an aviation cadet in the U.S. Army Air Corps at Colorado. He completed flying school and was promoted to second lieutenant and got his wish---fighters. Second Lieutenant George Brosius, Service No. O-773553 was assigned to the 68th Fighter Squadron, 347th Fighter Group. The Fighter Group was part of the U.S. Thirteenth Army Air Force which operated in the Pacific Theater of Operations.

At 1400 on June 5, 1945, Second Lieutenant George Brosius departed Morotai Airdrome (APO 926) in his Lockheed P-38L-5 Lightning, Aircraft Serial No. 44-26305 as part of a flight of seven P-38 Lightning fighters on a routine ferry mission. The flight set out on a course of 308 degrees enroute their home station at Puerto Princesa, Palawan (APO 719-1). As the flight pushed forward, the weather conditioned worsened and the flight leader, with George on his wing, attempted to break through the clouds into what looked like a clearing. Poor discipline caused the five other P-38s to break up and scatter, but Lieutenant Brosius stayed tight like a leech on his wingman, First Lieutenant Frederick A. Roos, Service No. O-708759.

The two climbed upwards to about 22,000 feet when George began reporting mechanical difficulties. First, his airspeed indicator froze up; then his left engine and prop began to act up. It appeared his electrical system went out as his prop ran away and his engine began detonating---throwing black smoke out the turbo charger. He lost control of the plane, broke away from Roos and began to spiral earthwards. At 1510 hours local time, George made his last radio contact to Roos stating, "I'm bailing out."

When Lieutenant Roos finally broke out of the clouds about 80 miles northeast of Morotai, he contacted the second Emergency Air Rescue Search Squadron and gave them the dope on Lieutenant Brosius' last known location in the vicinity of the Sangihe Islands, more commonly known today as the Sangir Islands. The islands are located northeast of Sulawesi in the Celebes Sea, roughly halfway between Sulawesi and Mindanao, in the Philippines.

On June 6, 1945, the Air Rescue Search Squadron searched the area with negative results. The following day, First Lieutenant Roos took up six planes and conducted a second detailed search of the area, again---negative results. After a total of four days of searching, Missing Air Crew Report (MACR)-14654 initiated June 6, 1945, reported Second Lieutenant George Brosius missing in action June 5, 1945 over the Sangihe Islands. The report attributed mechanical failure as the sole reason for the tragic event. Back at home, the War Department notified the Brosius family by telegram at Rural Route 1; regretfully informing them George was missing in action---presumed dead. Later, George was later officially declared dead, remains non-recoverable.

Today, Second Lieutenant George Ellery Brosius is forever memorialized on the Tablets of the Missing at Manila American Cemetery in Manila, The Philippines.

Mr. George, a retired employee of Union Carbide Mining and Metals, had been a Rifle resident for many years.

Ruby Leona Egbert McKee George was caught in the Parachute Train Robbery of 1904 but did not know it.

She did not know it because she was 55 days old, it was 1 am, and she probably slept through it. Contemporary accounts say her mother Effie Egbert was also not aware it happened.

Ruby was born April 13, 1904, in Missouri. Her parents Walter and Effie were very new in Colorado having arrived in 1902. And because they were still settling in, Effie had returned to her old family home for the birth.

On the day of the robbery, June 7, 1904, mom and daughter were to travel on Denver and Rio Grande Train Number 5 and meet Walter in DeBeque. When it arrived in Parachute, it was after 1 am in the morning, all the other passengers had disembarked in Rifle.

As the train pulled out of Parachute, mom and daughter were alone except for the conductor. DeBeque was to be the next stop, except the train was stopped by Kid Curry. Unfortunately for Curry, he missed the train he intended to rob, Colorado Midlands 105, by 10 minutes. It was the train with the payroll on it.

History records that very little money was stolen, and in the next several days, a scramble to escape left Curry dead by his own bullet. He is buried in Glenwood. Or maybe South America if the alternate story is correct.

Ruby grew up in our area, the 1910 census locates her in Grand Valley. Ruby had lived in Rifle since 1925.

Ruby was lunch room supervisor for Esma Lewis Elementary. She taught a group of girls to crochet in her "Snappy Stitcher" 4H club. Her ability to teach, have patience and turn them into award winning crocheters at a young age was priceless.

Including both marriages, Ruby was married 52 years. She is buried in Rose Hill with Bill as a McKee.
